It's hard to believe that another school year is nearly over! We have had another busy and exciting term in the Primary 1 and 2 classroom.

We started off the term going 'Down the Town' and learning all about our local town of Ballymena. We looked at the different shops you would find in the town and even designed our own Diamond Towns. Jayne from Danske Bank came to talk to us about money and the importance of saving. She even brought her

friend Pondus the Penguin with her!

Our new topic is called 'Off we go' and we have already been to the moon and on a bear hunt. We have been learning all about journeys and have been thinking both of places we have been and places we would like to go to. We even imagined we had a magic carpet and had to tell everyone where we would go on it. A highlight of this term has been our trip to Portglenone Forest which we all thoroughly enjoyed.









In our Numeracy lessons Primary 1 have been revising their numbers to 10 and learning to add and write sums. Primary 2 have been revising their addition and subtraction facts. We are all really good at finding long things and short things and Primary 2 have been putting objects in order of length. We have recently started a new topic of weight and are having great fun investigating and sorting things into heavy and light.



During Literacy time Primary 1 have been developing their reading skills and are progressing well. They are working hard to put sounds together to read and make words. Primary 2 have been revising their double sounds and love to write lots of stories.



New ipads for every classroom!

We are delighted to have been able to purchase ipads for use in every classroom in school. This is an exciting development for staff and pupils alike as we will now have a wonderful resource for teaching across the curriculum.

At The Diamond the children are extremely confident in the area of ICT, creating documents, leaflets, powerpoint presentations, spreadsheets and editing videos related to class topics.





Over the past few years video conferencing and the school website have become important parts of school life.

So many of our children already know how to use tablet devices so we are eager to encourage them to further develop their numeracy and literacy skills with these ipads. The ipads are already compatible with some of our current initiatives - Accelerated Reader and standardised assessments to name but two so hopefully we can hit the ground running.

P2 - P3 are growing up just great!

This term has been all go in the P2 and P3 classroom. Numeracy lessons have been busy, with P3 learning about place value and P2 practising adding and taking away. In P2 we used crocodiles to make number sentences using 'greater than' and 'smaller than'. In P3 we used material to add tens and units. We are getting really good at doing sums neatly and without mistakes. Both classes have been learning all about length and how to compare items of differing lengths.



We also have been enjoying our theme 'Growing is great' where we have explored things that grow and how they grow. Every day we looked forward to checking the progress of the runner beans we had planted and seeing the roots develop under the soil. When the beans had grown a little we planted them out in the raised bed. We also planted sunflower seeds to take home and look after. We hope there is some sunshine this summer to make them grow really tall!







We also painted some beautiful sunflowers to put us in a summery mood. We enjoyed many stories about growing, with 'The Last Noo-Noo' being our favourite. Another story we enjoyed was 'The Enormous Turnip' and now we are having fun acting it out as we prepare for our Summer Concert.

It's hard to believe that we have nearly reached the end of the school year and we will soon be moving to our next classes - we are already looking forward to all the exciting things we will learn!




P4 - 5 take a giant leap 'on our doorstep'






































P5-6 are all fired up!
