All have settled in well and are very much part of The Diamond family.



In our World Around Us work we have really enjoyed learning all about our bodies. We found out lots of interesting facts about them. We really liked learning about all our bones and loved listening to the story of Funnybones. We even made our own Mr X-Ray. We also liked stamping our fingerprints and we talked about how we are all different. We looked at our school motto - 'We are all different, we are all unique, we are all special!'



The highlight of our topic was a visit from an optician from Specsavers in Ballymena. She told us all about her job and gave each child in school a reflective vest to keep us safe in the dark winter mornings. We will be starting a new topic about Toys and Teddies very soon.



In Literacy work Primary 2 have been working hard to review all their sounds. They are getting really good at using them to read and make lots of words. They are enjoying reading in a group.

In Numeracy work Primary 2 have been learning how to add and take away while Primary 1 have been learning the numbers to 5. We completed

lots of work on repeating patterns and everyone enjoyed making their own repeating patterns. We have also been learning all about shapes.

Other activities we have really enjoyed include using the iPads and computers during ICT, using the gym equipment during PE lessons and our coaching for Christ sessions.

This term our theme has been 'Zoom Zoom' where we have been learning all about transport. We have thoroughly enjoyed all the activities completed throughout the term. We looked at how we travel to school and on holidays. We also learned about different kinds of cars, parts of cars and which cars are suitable for different people. During activity-based learning we were working in the car garage and also selling cars to members of staff! Some children carried out a survey counting the



colours and types of vehicles travelling past the school. We also learned about trains and how they have changed through the years. Most of the boys in our class were very excited about the bullet trains. Perhaps the highlight of our



term was our trip to Wrightbus. Here we got to learn about how buses are made and how the factory works. We loved riding around the factory in a London Bus. We had a fantastic day.

During activity-based learning we have been investigating floating and sinking, building vehicles, looking for missing cargo and learning about Road Safety. Primary 3 carried out their own investigative work on transport types and made brilliant little projects about it.



Another highlight of our term has been our new iPads and their integration into the curriculum. We have used them to make books, learn about shapes, practise our writing, learn about directions and even for reading comprehension. P2 have been learning to use the iPads to explore the school website while P3 have been learning how to make powerpoint presentations.

In numeracy we have been learning about data handling and different ways to show information. More recently our topic has been 2d and 3d shape. P2 have also been learning about subtraction while p3 have been focusing on the 100 square and patterns on it, such as odd and even, and adding 10.

In literacy we have been focusing on lots of sound work as well as understanding what we read. The P3s have been learning about persuasive writing and how we can use writing to persuade others to agree with us.

Another of our favourite activities has been gymnastics, where we have been growing in confidence on the gym time equipment.





P4 and 5 are just 'out of this world!'

Our first theme of the year was **Reach for the Stars.** We enjoyed learning all about space and the planets. We researched our own facts about space using the internet and books. We also used a number of websites to find out what life is like in space for an astronaut. We learned that astronauts need to be very fit so in P.E. we made up our own fitness routines and showed them to the rest of the class. We also created a healthy menu for an astronaut. We then started to learn about light and dark in our theme and found out about nocturnal and diurnal animals.



We even looked at the human eye and found out a bit more about how we see. We painted pictures by a famous artist called Thomas Kinkade who was known as the 'Painter of Light.' We also had fun connecting up a circuit to make a bulb light and experimented with different materials to see if they allowed light through.



In Numeracy this year we have had lots of fun using practical materials to help us with our work. We have used the dienes blocks to help with addition and subtraction. We have been







using right angle finders to find angles around the school. We have also been learning about time and are getting really good at telling the time. We have played games to help learn how to find the co-ordinates of objects and enjoyed jumping in the co-ordinates grid in the playground.

In literacy we have been learning all about the features of narrative writing and have written a number of narratives about our theme. The class

are enjoying the accelerated reading programme and are very enthusiastic to take quizzes and choose new books. In class we continue to read in groups and have been getting to grips with our Reciprocal Reading roles.

One highlight in the classroom this term has been getting to use the iPads in our work. We have been using them in all areas of the curriculum and the children are growing in confidence and skill in using them. In narrative writing for instance the children used an app called Puppet Pal to help them plan a narrative in groups. The class have used them to aid with research and to complete many tasks set in the classroom. Next term we will look forward to using more of the applications to further enhance our learning.

HARVEST

Our Harvest Celebrations were held on 22nd and 23rd October 2015. Each class took part and our school choir and handbell group also featured. Mr Beattie gave a talk at the end and using a pumpkin demonstrated how we should let the love of Jesus 'shine from the inside out' in our own lives.

















Recently at The Diamond, we've been getting very technical!

The iPads we have been able to purchase for school have opened up all sorts of learning opportunities and the children have been enjoying and benefiting from using these in class.

One fantastic programme we have begun using recently is Seesaw. Our P5/6 class trialled this programme during the first term and it proved so successful that we're now rolling it out for every child.



'Seesaw' allows children to share their work with their parents at home – immediately!



Our children have been enjoying uploading photos or videos of their class work into the seesaw app so that parents can see how they're getting on and achieving in school. Parents receive notifications on their smartphone or computer and can 'like' or comment on the post that's been uploaded by their child. It's a great encouragement for the children to receive this praise during the day!

As we progress with this programme, we hope to use it in a supportive way too. The teacher may find it useful to communicate with parents as to how you can support your child's learning at home — with examples from classwork books or other sources.



It's been plain sailing for P6 and P7

We have been very busy in P6/7 this term learning lots of new and exciting things. Our theme 'A Titanic Tale' sparked a lot of curiosity and proved to be an extremely interesting topic. We learned how to build stable structures and make weak materials stronger during our exploration of the Arrol Gantry which was erected to construct the Titanic's hull. Our spaghetti engineering challenge gave us insight into the importance of triangulation!



Another highlight involved preparing our own news reports using green screen technology to announce the launch of the hull. We definitely have some budding actors and actresses in P6/7! The class enjoyed learning about some of the characters responsible for the building of the Titanic and showed empathy when the focus shifted to the passengers on board. Our floating and sinking investigations were also enjoyed by all! Seascapes were the focus of both art and music activities.

In numeracy we have covered a range of topics and have particularly enjoyed applying our understanding of the four operations in 'real life' problem solving contexts. Factors and multiples





was a popular topic amongst the P6 boys who have now turned their attention to long multiplication. We have also started working on telling the time in analogue, digital and 24hour format. P7 have been learning to shop within a budget. They have also been learning all about mirror lines. One highlight involved using the iPads to record the findings of a 'symmetry challenge'. The children submitted their work in the form of a poster using the 'Pic Kids' app.



We have made great progress through our reciprocal reading activities this term and are continuing to enjoy group sessions. Nevertheless, 'Big Boss' remains the favoured role! Our shared, group and independent comprehension activities have focused on the conventions of both play scripts and advertisements. The boys and girls enjoyed learning about the role of the copywriter and had a go at creating their own adverts. More recently, the class has shown great flair through their exploration of different forms of poetry. We have been thinking about how to paint strong images with words. We have also been learning about narrative. After writing a 'whole class' adventure about a roller coaster ride, the boys and girls created their own Christmas themed narratives.



On 18th November we held a 'Duvet Day' to reward P6/7 for all of their hard work in Term 1. It gave them the opportunity to unwind and encouraged a positive mindset for those P7 children who were sitting their first entrance examination the following day. The children were invited to bring in their duvets and enjoyed a morning of games, hot chocolate and a special pancake bar. After break, they had a visit from the Godmodex bus, in which they had the chance to play some computer games, dance and just have fun! The afternoon was spent decorating stones which reminded them that 'they rock' in God's eyes. The day culminated in a Shloer reception with Mr Beattie. A great big 'well done' to all of the P7 pupils who recently completed examinations in our local grammar schools. We are all looking forward to a 'test free' Term 2 which the children will no doubt tackle with the same energy and enthusiasm!
